### REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

A Variety Of Course Schedules Are Employed In Order to be as Responsive as possible to Student Scheduling Needs. In order to meet student needs, the University reserves the right to make changes in this schedule—including but not limited to adding, canceling or redesigning a course.

Meet with your **Academic Advisor** (see below for directory), or the **Provost** for selection of general education courses, courses required for your primary field of study (your academic major), and elective courses. There are four major fields (each with two or three concentration options). The University can also help you **design a major field** based on courses you have taken at APU, courses you transfer, and college-equivalent life learning.

**You may also register on line at [www.americanpathways.edu](http://www.americanpathways.edu). Call 303-839-2551 for your on-line registration password if you do not have one.**

Students may **register for Academic Credit** or for **NonCredit** or **Audit**. Students who register for **NonCredit** (at no charge other than textbook costs) or **Audit** do not receive college credit but are expected to complete all of the requirements mandated for students taking the course for credit. Students may later convert **NonCredit** or **Audit** courses into college credit by modifying their registration in the course to **Credit** and paying the difference between the **NonCredit status**, or **Audit** fee they have already paid, and the tuition required for credit. For more information, see your academic advisor or the Provost.

**Courses in the semester schedule are listed by Academic Field of Study. This means that computer courses are listed first, followed by communications courses – English, public speaking – through the sociology courses.** Other courses may be added to meet student needs. If necessary to meet special needs of students, courses not scheduled this semester but are in the *University Catalog* may be completed by **Preceptorial Study** – see your Advisor or the Provost for more detail.

**PREC** means **Preceptorial**. At APU a preceptorial is a small class of one, or only a few, students, in which the Preceptor (a lecturer or other academic faculty) gives individual attention to the students. Preceptorials are scheduled at times convenient for student and faculty.

**TBA:** indicates that the course (and sometimes faculty and learning center) is **To Be Arranged** (TBA – that is, scheduled at a time most convenient for students, as determined through determination of student needs to Academic Advisors and the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs.

**PREC.** means that the course has a prerequisite course that must be completed with an acceptable grade before you may register for the course you desire. For example, ENG 102 English Composition II has the Preq. ENG 101 English Composition I.

**SEC.** means there is more than one section of the same course is offered in that term, e.g., BUS 381 – Sec 1, BUS 381 – Sec. 2

**\*\*Refers to courses that are part of the University's general education requirement and conform to the State of Colorado's General Education model – this means that this particular course may transfer to other public colleges (depending on that institution's transfer of credit policies) and that courses in that field of study taken at another public college that are listed in the State's transfer guide will transfer to APU (if the student has a grade of C or above in the course). APU does not, and cannot, guarantee transfer of credit. That determination is always the decision of the college or university to which credits are submitted for transfer.**

Disclaimer: In the interest of effective education and meeting student needs, the University reserves the right to reschedule a course and reassign faculty, and in cases of insufficient enrollment to cancel a course or courses.

## STUDENT HANDBOOK AND FERPA

(Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act)

The *Student Handbook* is published as a separate document, available from the Office of the Provost, in the *Catalog*, and on the University website ([americanpathways.edu](http://americanpathways.edu)). It delineates University ethics and decorum and student rights and due process. The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords students certain rights with respect to their educational records. In accordance with FERPA, only those University Officials who have with general or specific responsibility for promoting the educational objectives of the University or third parties under contract with the University to provide professional, business and similar administrative services related to the University's educational mission. "Legitimate educational interests" are defined as interests that are essential to the general process of higher education prescribed by the body of policy adopted by the governing board. At APU only those University Officials so designated by the President, Provost, or Dean of Students is authorized to have access to student academic or student life records. A student who wishes to ask the University to amend a record should write the University official responsible for the record, clearly identify the part of the record the student wants changed, and specify why it should be changed. If the University decides not to amend the record as requested, the University will notify the student in writing of the decision and advise the student of his or her right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the student when notified of the right to a hearing. The right to provide written consent before the University discloses personally identifiable information from the student's educational records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. For more on the University's procedures, see the *Student Handbook*.

## FINANCIAL AID

University tuition is affordable for residents of urban and inner city Denver because all students enrolling for academic credit will qualify for financial aid in the form of an APU Scholarship or Grant. Scholarships range from 5% to 80% depending on student need.

The following example is for a student who qualifies for the maximum tuition scholarship of 80% of tuition. Different scholarship amounts change the final cost. Your Academic Advisor and the office of Financial Affairs will determine your scholarship level, which is based on financial need. Financial need is determined by your Adjusted Gross Income listed on your (or where relevant, your parents') IRS Form 1040 or 1040A – see your Advisor for more details or refer to the Academic Catalog “financial aid” section. The example shows tuition and fees for a three-credit course from which the scholarship of 80% of tuition has been factored in and deducted. A \$10 Semester Activities fee is additional per semester to each student’s bill. Textbooks and learning materials are additional.
